Pastor's Message

During the WWII bombing of London, Ronald Knox-a priest, radio personality, detective novelist, scholar, and Catholic convert--found himself the chaplain of a girls' school where students were being sheltered. When his existing homilies were exhausted. Knox began to write new ones for his students based on the Apostles' Creed. The homilies were so well-received that they were later published in the U,S. in 1945 as "The Creed in Slow Motion:". With resurgent interest in the life and writings of Knox, the new edition of this classic re-released in 2009 could not be more timely . (Ronald Knox, *The Creed*

in Slow Motion (Ava Maria Press,). While writing "I believe in the resurrection," Knox said that since it was Jesus, the Son of God, who was buried on Good Friday, you would expect that as soon as he died he would come to life again. Then he wrote these fascinating words: "Every second during which Jesus stayed dead, on Good Friday and Holy Saturday and

Easter Sunday morning, was a kind of miracle; a much more remarkable miracle really than his Resurrection." Knox was telling us that life was so inherent in Jesus, so native to everything Jesus Christ is, that it's no miracle that he was raised on Easter. It was more of a miracle that he remained in the tomb for as long as he did, during the hours between Friday afternoon and Sunday morning. For Jesus to remain dead was out of character with who he is. Jesus Christ is the Lord of life; death has no dominion over him. He must rise from the dead. He stayed in the tomb long enough for it to be very clear that he was, indeed, dead; but staying there was out of order for this Lord of life. As we begin our journey through Lent and Holy Week, I pray that each of us will find a moment to sit quietly and ponder the fact that the spotless Lamb of God, suffered and died for our sins, because those sins were a debt, we could not repay. And conquering death, paved the way for our own resurrection to eternal life.

"Oh, to see my name written in the wounds. For through Your suffering I am free. Death is crushed to death, life is mine to live, won through Your selfless love. This, the power of the cross, Son of God, slain for us. What a love, what a cost. We stand forgiven at the cross" (The Power of the Cross) by Stuart Townend In Service to Christ, Pastor Tom Ash Wednesday Service will be
