Dear Partners in the Gospel,

Pastor Sue and I read a devotional every morning, Cheri Fuller's "Praying the Promises of God". I'd like to share one of her recent daily offerings.

Jesus saw numerous displays of wealth as the pillars and leaders of the community dropped their offerings— many of them with great fanfare— into the treasury chests that sat in the Temple's outer courtyard. Jesus didn't dismiss the gifts of the wealthy, but he did call attention to the widow's gift. In a setting where many were hoping to be noticed and admired, the widow quietly gave her gift, assuming it to be so paltry that it would not make any difference. She was not giving out of a desire to be admired but out of love and obedience. That's what set her gift apart. That's what gave her gift its heft.

The value of our monetary gifts to the Kingdom is that they are a measure of our hearts. The most important gift given that day was the smallest gift of all, given extravagantly. The amount of money we give to support Kingdom causes really doesn't matter. God can multiply small gifts and use them to accomplish big results. If the wealthiest people on earth were to give all they have to the work of the Kingdom, it would be a small amount. God values a gargantuan sum no more than he does the widow's gift. What matters is what your financial gifts to the Kingdom say about your priorities. God knows how easily we can come to love money and let it dictate our lives, influence our decisions, determine our emotional states. Money can become an idol faster than almost anything you can name. That's why God wants us to remember that it is all his. Why do you think God chooses to finance God's work and meet the needs of God's children through the financial gifts of God's people? I think God allows God's people to give because their obedience releases his abundance. Father, everything I have is yours. Use it as you will.

Why we give to God is the first step to understand what we give to God. Time, Talent, Treasure. Gifts that we give with Joy, God uses to bless. Tending God's blessings is our greatest Joy as Christians.

What is Pentecost? The Birthday of the Church

Many folks wear their Packer, Brewers or Bucks gear to support the Wisconsin sports teams. So on Pentecost Sunday, June 5 let us as Lutherans (and other) Christians trade in their gear for the color of **RED**.

Why is it customary to wear red on Pentecost?

Wearing red represents the tongues of flame that rested upon the disciples as the Holy Spirit was poured out upon the first followers

of Jesus. Together, we will celebrate that the Holy Spirit continues to breathe life into the church, and we continue to proclaim the mighty acts of God to all the world!

Here are a few other interesting tidbits to help you move deeper into the story of Pentecost:

- Pentecost means "50" in Greek the Day of Pentecost is celebrated 50 days after Easter.
- **Jews have Pentecost too** it is the Greek name for the Festival of Shavuot or "Weeks" (7 weeks after Passover). It celebrates the giving of the Law on Mt. Sinai.
- Pentecost is often called the "Birthday of the Church" because the Holy Spirit empowers the church to carry out the mission of Jesus Christ in the world.
- It was windy a great wind blew through the assembly. In the original biblical languages, one word "ruach" in Hebrew and "pneuma" in Greek is translated as both "wind" and "spirit" in English.
- Everyone understood the Pentecost story reports that people from many countries and regions were present at the outpouring of the Holy Spirit, and all heard the telling of God's deeds of power in their own languages. This is different than the spiritual practice of "speaking in tongues" when otherwise indiscernible utterings must be interpreted by a believer with the gift of interpretation. This was a miraculous translation, likely intended to indicate the global reach of the Good News.


